

GENERAL SHOW REGULATIONS

- 1. General entries must be made on the relevant entry form which is to be delivered to the Secretary at the Henderson Pavilion by 6pm on Friday 10 OCTOBER 2025; however earlier entries are encouraged. Each exhibitor will be given a sticker which must be attached to each exhibit to ensure exhibits are placed into their correct Section and Class.
- 2. <u>All pavilion exhibits, (except where otherwise specified) must be delivered</u> to the Henderson Pavilion by the **time stated in Pavilion Conditions**. This regulation will be strictly enforced.
- 3. <u>All Outside Exhibitors</u> must restrict their activities to the area allotted as per Ground Space Application. Society regulations require that all Ground fees MUST be paid prior to Show Day.
- **4.** The judges have the power to withhold any prize if they deem the Exhibit unworthy or give a lesser prize; or they may award Special Prizes in the form of Certificates of Merit, for exhibits which they may deem worthy.
- **5.** All Articles shown must be the Bona Fide property of the exhibitor (except in Flowers for decorative arrangements).
- **6.** In cases of a <u>difference of opinion</u> between judges, the services of an independent judge will be used.
- 7. Society Membership for 2025/26 is \$20 with free Admission to Showgrounds for everyone.
- **8.** <u>No person</u> except those considered necessary will be allowed to accompany exhibits and/or exhibitors at judging.
- **9.** Any person being an exhibitor <u>will not be allowed to be present during the adjudication</u> of the Judges (excepting Livestock and in any section where the Judge deems it necessary) and any exhibitor remaining near the Judge will forfeit all right to a prize in that Section.
- **10.** No person shall be permitted to exhibit in any classes for which he or she is acting as a Steward.
- **11.** The Society will not in any circumstances hold itself responsible for any loss or mis-delivery of any exhibit at the Society's exhibition or any damage thereto.
- **12.** Any person insulting or interfering with the Judges during the Show will be subject to removal from the grounds and the prizes awarded to him/her forfeited. Members of the Society so aggressing will be liable to expulsion.
- **13.** No appeal, against the decision of the Judges will be entertained unless the same is made in writing and lodged with the Show Secretary before 6 o'clock on the day of the Show and a deposit of \$10 lodged, which will be forfeited if the Committee considers the appeal to be frivolous.
- **14.** <u>In the event of any protest being received</u> it will be considered by the Committee at the next meeting after the Show and its decision shall be final.
- **15.** No exhibit shall be allowed to be removed before 4.00pm on Show Day and will, in every respect, be considered the property of the Society until that time.
- **16.** Only Prize cards won at this Show will be allowed to be placed on exhibits. Your prize card is your pay voucher. Children under 16 years of age must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. All prize money must be checked before exhibitor leaves the showground as no appeal will be considered after Show Day.
- 17. Prizemoney not collected on Show Day may be forfeited.
- **18.** All individual Exhibitors must provide a <u>completed and signed Entry form</u> ONE PERSON ONLY per entry form.
- **19.** Any infringement of these rules will disqualify exhibitors from taking prizes awarded to them.
- 20. This Society is affiliated with the North Eastern Agricultural Societies Association and V.A.S. Ltd. It has been determined by these bodies that in the event of any exhibitor being offensive to any Judge, their entry will be declined by all Societies affiliated with the Association and any prize money won by them shall be withheld. Other penalties imposed by any Society in the association will be upheld and endorsed by all affiliated members.
- 21. Owners entering livestock do so entirely at their own risk and it is a condition of entry in any event that no liability of any kind attaches to the Society, the Committee, Officials and Members in any respect whatsoever. The Society will not be responsible for any accident that may be caused through or by any exhibit and it shall be a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall hold the Society harmless and indemnify it against any legal proceedings arising from such an accident.
- **22.** In Classes where there are prizes and trophies for "Most Successful Exhibitor" points will be allotted as follows; First 4 points, Second 2 points, Third or Highly Commended- 1 point. In the event of a tie, the count back is to apply. Exhibitors must have received at least 2 prizes in a Section to be eligible for Most Successful Exhibitor for that Section.

- First Prize will be \$4.00; Second Prize will be \$2.00 unless otherwise stated. Your Prize Card is your Voucher for prize money, which will be available after 4.30pm on Show Day.
- Children exhibiting on Show Day MUST be in the Year or Grade referred to in the Class heading.
- Return postage for Exhibits is paid for by the Exhibitor.
- All Exhibits are to be the bona fide work of the Exhibitor. The maker's name must not be visible.
- No one article can be entered in two sections.
- Entries must be lodged at the Show Office and the Exhibit ticket supplied must be attached to the Exhibit or Cage in the case of Poultry.
- Novice Sections are limited to persons who have not won a first prize for an Open or Novice Class in that Section at previous Rutherglen Shows.
- Exhibitors may not enter both Novice and Open Classes in the same Section.
- Entrants in 13-18 years Cookery section are eligible to participate for one year following a first prize.
- All Exhibits must be clean, produced in the previous 12 months, and must not have been previously exhibited at any Rutherglen Show.

Recipe

185 g ($1\frac{1}{4}$ cups) SR flour pinch of salt 90 g butter 60 g ($\frac{1}{4}$ cup) castor sugar 1 egg 1 dessertspoon coffee essence ½ teaspoon vanilla essence

jam or icing

Preheat the oven to moderately hot (200 °C in a conventional electric oven).

Sift together the flour and salt. Cream the butter and sugar in a small bowl until light and fluffy.

In a separate bowl, beat the egg, then add the coffee and vanilla. Gradually add the egg mixture to the butter and sugar. Stir in the flour to make a stiff consistency.

When the dough is well mixed, use a teaspoon to drop it on a greased oven tray. Bake for 8-10 minutes.

Place on a cake rack to cool. When cold, join two halves together with jam or icing. Sprinkle the top with a little icing sugar.

MAKES ABOUT 12 COMPLETED KISSES.

Tips from the cook

- Try using a bit less sugar, which can also help make the texture finer for showing.
- Mavis likes joining them with strawberry jam.
- If you are using salted butter you might not need to add extra salt.
- You don't have to use castor sugar in this recipe, ordinary white sugar will do.

How Many to Present:

Please choose your best 6 to carefully present on a plate.

More Baking Tips:

- Well-cooked and dry
- No scorching of the edges or over colouring
- Pale golden on top & base
- The texture should be short & light
- Flavour both biscuit & filling should be sweet

Tips from the judges

- The kisses should be uniform in size and shape, slightly domed, with the pairs matching exactly.
- The layer of filling must be even and the finish smooth, with no loose flour.

Recipe

Ingredients - Preferred 100% Australian Grown Produce

- 250g sultanas
- 250g chopped raisins
- 250g currants
- 125g chopped mixed peel
- 90g chopped red glace cherries
- 90g chopped blanched almonds
- 1/3 cup sherry or brandy
- · 250g plain flour
- · 60g self-raising flour

- 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 250g butter
- 250g soft brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind
- 1/2 teaspoon almond essence
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence
- 4 large eggs

Method

Cut the fruit & almonds into 3-4 pieces and mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.

Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, and then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.

Place the mixture into a prepared tin 20 cm square, straight sided, square cornered tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3½ - 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.



AVIAN INFLUENZA (BIRD FLU)

Current situation

Last updated 13 June 2025

There have been no new cases of H7N8 high pathogenicity bird flu since late February 2025.

As a consequence of successfully implementing disease eradication activities, quarantine has been revoked on the 4 infected properties near Euroa and the control order surrounding the area has been lifted.

There are no longer movement restrictions around the Euroa area.

This progress is a significant step towards establishing Australia's claim to freedom from high pathogenicity avian influenza.

Any suspicion of an emergency animal disease (EAD) should be immediately reported to the 24-hour EAD Hotline on 1800 675 888 or to your local yet.



Keeping poultry safe at bird shows

Bird shows are not allowed within the control area during an outbreak

Outside this grea, bird shows are a great opportunity for breeders and exhibitors to showcase breeds and compete for coveted titles. However, disease can spread because of close contact between birds and handlers from different locations.

Biosecurity measures at bird shows to help prevent the spread of diseases include

- . Don't bring any birds to the show if there's illness in the home flock.
- Clean and disinfect all bird equipment, cages and containers before and after shows.
- · Judges and handlers should disinfect hands between birds where possible. Exhibitors should only handle their own birds.
- Ensure you guarantine show birds for 14 days before they're reintroduced to the home flock.
- Keep records of bird movements to assist traceback in the event of a disease outbreak









We will also be presenting a Show Pigeon display this year in the Poultry Pavilion, make sure you take a look at these beautiful birds.

- 1. This competition is a test of the dog's jumping ability.
- 2. The competition is open to all dogs.
- 3. The dog is permitted to jump onto or over the jump.
- 4. All dogs not competing must be on a lead with a handler in the marshalling area behind the competition area.
- 5. Competition area should be 15 metres long by 8 metres wide.
- 6. Only one dog may be loose in the competition area at any one time.
- 7. There must be a handler at the top of the jump to act as a catcher if necessary and a handler as a catcher at the bottom.
- 8. The dog's owner must supply one extra handler.
- 9. A ladder will be provided for the handler.
- 10. Each dog is allowed three attempts at each height.
- 11. In the event of two dogs jumping the same height, the winner shall be determined as the dog that took the least number of attempts for the winning height.
- 12. A dog may compete on a loose lead.
- 13. If the dog is not on a loose lead the dog must be released at a minimum of three metres from the jump.
- 14. Any mishandling or misuse of a dog will incur immediate disqualification.
- 15. If, in the opinion of the Stewards, the dog is unsafe to other competitors or the general public it will be withdrawn from the competition.

TENT PEGGING COMPETITION

Event commences at 1.30pm

Presented by Victorian Tent Pegging Association

What is tent pegging?

Tent pegging is a cavalry sport of ancient origin and is one of only ten equestrian disciplines officially recognized by the International Equestrian Federation.

According to the Federation, it is believed that tent pegging originated in India in the middle ages in the battlefields as a tactic used by the horsed cavalry against elephant mounted troops.

It is certainly related to the idea that cavaliers mounting a surprise pre-dawn raid on an enemy camp could use their skills to sever or uproot tent pegs, thus collapsing the tents on their sleeping occupants and causing havoc and terror in the camp.



The specific game of tent pegging has a mounted horseman riding at a gallop and using a sword or a lance to pierce, pick up, and carry away a small ground target (a symbolic tent peg) or a series of small ground targets.

The broader class of tent pegging games also includes ring jousting (in which a galloping rider tries to pass the point of his weapon through a suspended ring); lemon sticking (in which the rider tries to stab or slice a lemon suspended from a cord or sitting on a platform); quintain tilting (in which the rider charges a mannequin mounted on a swivelling or rocking pedestal); and Parthian (i.e. mounted) archery.
